*The Wandering Apostle: Paul, Travel, and the Rhetoric of Empire* (Synkrisis; New Haven: Yale University Press, forthcoming).

Offering a fresh interpretation of the letter preserved in 2 Corinthians 1-9, *The Wandering Apostle* investigates Paul's discursive reshaping of his own traveling form of life as a way of re-defining the new social role of "apostle." The study views Paul as deploying travel as a "wandering signifier," evoking a series of ancient traveling figures in order to rearrange his communities and the broader, imperial landscape. Methodologically, it locates its argument at the intersection of New Testament studies, Classics, and Critical Theory, engaging in particular recent post-Marxist approaches to Paul's letters and social change.
